school age members brainstormed T-shirt designs ideas and came up with some very clever images. The T-shirts will be made for May. Big thanks to Tim and Molly-jo.


Fleece Tie Blanket Project for Camp New Day

ANNUAL MEETING ISSUE

The Board of Trustees has revised and implemented changes to the Real Property Fund Charter, the primary thrust of which is to reduce the number of Real Property Fund Trustees from five to three and to simplify the procedures by which they operate. The changes to the Congregation's by-laws set forth below are needed to conform the by-laws to the new Charter. The Board of Trustees will ask the Congregation to vote on the language set forth below at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, May 19, 2013. The Board of Trustees recommends that the language that is lined out be deleted and that the language in italics be adopted.

Article VII. Fund Trustees

- 1. The Fund Trustees shall serve as trustees of all endowment and other special funds of the Congregation. Except as specifically provided in this Article, the selection of Fund Trustees and their governance shall be set forth in separate guidelines established for each endowment or other special fund by the Board or Congregation.
- 2. The Fund Trustees shall consist of five (5) three (3) members, two (2) one (1) of

whom shall be a members of the Board of Trustees and three (3) two (2) of whom shall be non-Board members of the Congregation.

- 3. Normally, terms for Non-Board Fund Trustees shall be three years.
- 4. Any decisions made by the Fund Trustees shall be by a supermajority in which at least four (4) of the five (5) Trustees must consent. Fund Trustees may, by majority, recommend Fund expenditures to the Board of the Congregation. The Board will decide whether any recommended expenditures will be made.

Getting to Know Heidi Gould

Heidi was born in Marysville, Ohio. As a child, she attended a Baptist church, but when she was about five, she told her great grandmother that she did not want to go to church anymore. Her great grandmother said that was all right, "as long as when the bus comes to pick you up, you are watching a church service on TV." Heidi and her family moved to the Upper Peninsula when she was 11 or 12 years old. They settled in Shingleton and attended a Baptist church there now and then. When she was in her teens, she became interested in vampires and monsters.

In her early twenties, Heidi moved to California where she met and married her exhusband, an atheist and teacher in the Navy. She was taking classes, and when he came home, she wanted to go out and explore. He was tired, however, and wanted to go into his "man cave." Heidi began going to the Church of Christ in San Diego, a non-denominational Christian church. She began leading Bible studies and preparing those who wanted to be baptized. Whenever someone called to be saved, she went. Contradictions began emerging, and she found herself just going through the motions. It was not long before she left the church.

She soon became involved with the environmental movement and was active with the San Diego Green Party. They celebrated Earth Day, and she met others who were vegans. She liked the more nature-oriented religion and spirituality and considered herself a pagan/wiccan. When her husband was transferred to Hawaii, Heidi found a job there at a metaphysical gift store. She met psychics, and one who had a coven, and joined in the rituals. Eventually, she left her marriage and returned to the Upper Peninsula, pregnant with her daughter, Sky.

Heidi enrolled at Northern Michigan University and lived on campus for four years. Before long, she discovered the UUs and began attending when they were in the basement of the hotel on Third Street. She also came when UU was on Brickyard Road, not long after her son, Joe, was born and described herself as the one "standing in the back of the congregation, swinging her child up and over because he would not be still." She became a member and liked the UUs for the reasons most people do: acceptance, openness, diversity, all inclusiveness, respect, interconnections and different paths on a common ground. Heidi graduated from NMU in 2001 with a B.S. in Health Education.

In February 2004, Heidi considered going back to school to study clinical psychology. The program at NMU had been recently cut, so she went online to find one in a community that also had a UU congregation and an established Waldorf school (similar to the Montessori education program for children). Chapel Hill, NC, came up. Heidi contacted the UU congregation, and with their assistance, she connected with a host family, left her children with her parents for two weeks and took the bus to North Carolina. She introduced herself to the UU congregation, said she needed a job and had worked in a real estate office at one time. One of the members had her own real estate business and offered Heidi a secretarial position. She worked there for three

months before being hired at the University of North Carolina as an office assistant. Her children had joined her, and she held that job for two years while facing the challenges of a single mother with a daughter with type I diabetes and a son who had been diagnosed with autism.

In December 2006, Heidi and her children returned to the Upper Peninsula. Her parents and siblings ran a family restaurant in Shingleton and all eleven grandchildren lived on one block! Quarters were close, and it was not long before Heidi moved to Munising for a few years and then back to Marquette.

Heidi and her children currently share a house with two other women and another child. Sky is 17 now, attends the Alternative High School and is in the "out and about" stage but always keeps in touch by telephone. Joseph is in the fifth grade at North Star and tells his mother he loves her many times a day! Things have not been easy for Joe, but there has been some improvement these past few years. A new aid at school with the experience of raising an autistic child has been a huge factor in Joe's success as she is very intuitive, engaging and understanding.

Heidi has been working with the Marquette CARES (Communities Amending Recycling Efforts), a group she initiated, and has been invited to attend the Marquette Beautification and Restoration Committee's Spring Award luncheon to receive a "Green Spirit" award for her recycling efforts. She is also coordinating UP for Ending Corporate Personhood, a grassroots effort to stop the use of corporate money to finance political campaigns, affecting everything from the environment to medical care. Heidi is "one busy woman, living to Be the Change!"
