FROM: MqtUU President, Sarah Redmond



This past week we've had over 200 people visit Mqt. UU. The Susan Werner concert drew 152 people, raising \$1,971 for the Women's Center. Thanks again to Anne Stark for her quick thinking and ability to leverage a generous offer by Susan into a great evening of entertainment for 152 people and a way to support the Women's Center during Domestic Violence Awareness month. Kudos to Papa Crow, aka Jeff Krebs for performing and helping us with our audio set up.

On Saturday, another 50 individuals attended our "Going Solar in Upper Michigan" presentation by Steve Waller. The primary goal of our solar program was to prepare our members to vote on our solar installation proposal in January. The secondary goal is to bring this action step in reducing CO2 gases from our air by expanding our actions to the broader community. Lastly, we want to introduce ourselves to the broader community as a religion, as a church that walks the talk and lives our values. By engaging the local media, TV 6, TV10 and the Mining Journal, we've further expanded our outreach to the broader community.

All this is part of our implementing our Top 10 Board Goals for 2014-15 as developed at our August retreat. We keep these before us on a monthly basis to gage our progress.

The goals are:

- 1. Explore part-time minister options
- 2. Revitalize Religious Exploration (RE)
- 3. Tender Loving Care Coordinator and member-wide TLC survey
- 4. Pastoral Care Team
- 5. Review progress and have more active conversations with the congregation about the future
- 6. Mission/Vision Statements
- 7. Integration of newcomers into congregation
- 8. Tying actions to our 7 principles
- 9. Internal and external growth/increase membership
- 10. Continue structuring policies/procedures of the congregation

The action steps for just two of these goals, 1 and 9, involve connecting with our sister congregations in Escanaba and Houghton and doing media outreach into the community. If we are to grow, we need to let more of the community know we exist, what we believe and how we live that faith. To be able to consider a part-time minister, we may need to partner with a neighboring congregation. For that to happen we need to grow as do they; hence our interconnected web needs to expand.

These goals can't be just that of the Board, they need to have the active support of our members. Our Board Forums are the first Sunday of each month. We'll be talking about the Top Ten Goals at the November 2nd. Join us.

The curriculum for this month includes:

Seven principle coloring book toddlers-preschool

This coloring book is a great way to introduce Unitarian Universalist principles.

Creating Home k-2

This program helps children develop a sense of home that is grounded in faith.

Toolbox of Faith 3-5

Invites participants to reflect on qualities of our Unitarian Universalist faith, such as integrity, courage and love, as tools they can use in living their lives and building their own faith.

Amazing Grace: Exploring Right and Wrong 6-8

This program guides sixth graders through ways to determine right from wrong with a Unitarian Universalist perspective, and act on their new understandings.

Coming of Age 9-12

This is a Religious Exploration program that helps youth discern for themselves what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist, individually and as part of the larger faith community. It involves individual activities, group activities, family participation, and working with a mentor.

The Coming of Age (COA) group will be completing a vision quest this month and preparing for the COA worship service on **November 30th.**

Religious Exploration Coordinator Job Description

Part-time position up to 15 hrs/wk

The ideal candidate embraces a liberal, curiosity of religion; has the ability to connect with children, youth, and adults; has excellent communication skills and experience with project planning, volunteer recruitment, and enthusiasm for service learning.

A minimum of a bachelor's degree with emphasis in education or childhood development is preferred. Understanding of the Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism and its current focal points is a quality that could place the candidate above others.

If hired, the RE Coordinator will be expected to:

- Identify and recruit potential volunteers to assist with Sunday RE classes and special events for children and youth.
- Work effectively with children and youth and communicate well with adults.
- On Sunday mornings, ensure the smooth operation of RE classes which are led by volunteer members and will step in if a volunteer is not available.
- Gather materials, schedule speakers, reserve space, and handle other administrative skills to implement RE programs.
- Collaborate with the RE Committee, parents, and other interested members of the Marquette UU congregation to decide on appropriate curricula and class structures from *Tapestry of Faith* or *RE Express*, or to develop original RE programs for preschool children through high school youth. Establish goals and objectives for those RE programs and share the basic info in a brochure.
- With the RE Committee, schedule fundraisers, field trips, and meetings.
- Confer with parents and other congregation members to encourage support of and participation in RE activities.
- Maintain correspondence and communication with families and with committees in the congregation (regarding scheduling, programming, personnel issues, and networking)
- Administer reference/security checks for RE volunteers.
- Email monthly reports to the Mqt. UU Board of Trustees.
- Write and submit an RE column, which lists upcoming curricula and special events, to the Mqt UU Admin for the monthly *Chronicle*.
- Work with other individuals and groups within the congregation to set up child care for special programs.
- Coordinate the intergenerational story/lesson for Sunday services, working with service leaders and/or those who offer the main message for the morning.
- Abide by the Mqt. UU Personnel Guidelines.
- Pass the Michigan background check to work with children and youth.
