

Balancing Act XXII

Rush...and wait, rush...and wait. For a more tempered emotional state, it helps for me to put the "rushing and waiting" times in the context of a roller coaster ride. I used to delight in the rush as the coaster rapidly descended, and I enjoyed the relaxing bird's eye view of my surroundings as we crawled up, clickety-clack. The balance of working expeditiously... then relaxing patiently can be challenging for those of us who like to see a task completed in good time. I am more and more reminded though that sometimes the journey is long, even longer than a lifetime.

Big issues in social action work are often started, continued, then finally finished after one's life is over such as the women's right to vote in the U.S. after Susan B. Anthony and other suffragists died. Each step along the way helps in moving toward the goal and in learning from mistakes. Like the indigenous non-profit organization, Seventh Generation Fund, espouses, "Be a good ancestor."

The implication in the Great Law of the Iroquois Nations is to think seven generations ahead and decide whether the decisions they make today would benefit their children seven generations into the future. The original language is as follows:

"In all of your deliberations in the [Iroquois] Confederate Council, in your efforts at lawmaking, in all your official acts...look and listen for the welfare of the whole people and have always in view not only the present but also the coming generations." *

American Studies professor at SUNY, Buffalo and Onondaga Chief, Oren Lyons, calls to our attention that before Europeans settled in the 1600's, the Five Nations of the Iroquois lived under a constitution that had three main principles: peace, equity/justice and "the power of the good minds," that of the elders over the young. **

So please join Mqt. UU Board members on Sunday, May 18 following the service to deliberate and vote and practice democracy, as we consider our actions today which will benefit generations to come. What an awesome task – what a privilege!

RE Update!



Our high school students in the Coming of Age program will continue into the next school year under the guidance of Teri Rockwood and their mentors. Following the service on April 27, the Coming of Age program had a Spirituality Workshop.

The middle school students in the Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality program will continue into June with Paul Gray and gg gordon.

Our older elementary children are continuing their education on water and deep ecology with Michelle Lexmond. Below are reflections from April and themes for May, related primarily to our lower elementary children.

April 6th - Earth Day

Earth Day is truly every day and because Easter fell closer to April 22nd we celebrated a few weeks early! The students took turns reading "The Lorax" out loud. We discussed things we can do to help be better stewards of the land and are looking forward to our Tourist Park clean-up, once the snow melts!

April 13th – Passover

We learned in part about Passover through two well put together YouTube videos. The first short video was a collaboration of several young children telling us the story of Passover. We also watched a "Shalom Grover" video that explained the importance of a Passover Seder (the ritual a feast with symbolic dishes). It was great to have access to technology in our meeting house and the students responded well. We made a traditional dish called charoset (a sweet, brown, pebbly paste of fruits and nuts, representing the mortar used by the Jewish slaves to build storehouses for others). The children ate it while learning more about the Jewish faith tradition.





Our Deep Ecology group made posters for the pharmaceutical drop off held in Marquette. They learned the importance of proper disposal as it relates to our watershed.

What choices can we make to bring more abundant life to ourselves and the people around us?" We also dyed hard boiled eggs, hunted for cans, and had a small jelly bean filled egg hunt. April 27th – May Day

This service was beautifully led by Heidi Gould and the kids loved it! The intergenerational service included dancing around the hand crafted may pole and weaving love together in celebration of May. Following service the Coming of Age program had a Spirituality Workshop Tai Chi, Guided meditation with Melissa Middleton, Prayer beading with GG Gordon, Drumming with the Hatfield's and Spiritual reflections with our Coming of Age guide Teri Rockwood. May 4th – Death

We will read a story from India about a long ago person who asked the question, "What happens when a person dies?" and the answer he got. There are many burial practices throughout different religions. We will be learning about Jewish, Hindu, Muslim, Christian, and Buddhist traditions.

May 11th - Mother's Day and Julia Ward Howe

"Did anyone do anything special today for Mother's Day? These days people mostly celebrate Mother's Day by giving cards or making a special breakfast or giving them flowers or other nice ways of showing appreciation. Which is great, but actually, the original idea for Mother's Day was something quite different. The original Mother's Day idea came from Unitarian Julia Ward Howe, and this is her story."

May 18th- Flower Ceremony

This Intergenerational service is a change for the community to gather in celebration. We ask that all members bring a flower to contribute to the communal vase. The service will be lead by Teri Rockwood and Megan Foulks.
