

10 FAQs about Medicare's Role in End-of-life Care

Not long ago, the political controversy incited by the "death panel" myth prevented a provision that would have allowed Medicare to cover advance care planning from being included in the Affordable Care Act. Now, CMS recognizes the desire of patients and loved ones to express, and have health care providers respect, their unique wishes for end-of-life care. Starting January 1, CMS will reimburse physicians and other providers for talking with any Medicare recipient about their health care preferences at the end of life. Get up to speed ahead of this week's WIHI by reading the Kaiser Family Foundation's 10 FAQs about Medicare's role in end-of-life care. The FAQs do an excellent job of explaining Medicare's coverage of advance care planning and the new reimbursement rule.

What We're Reading: How One Woman Changed The Way People Die In Mongolia

Dr. Odontuya Davaasuren (right), a family doctor and professor at the Mongolian National University of Medical Sciences, was first exposed to palliative care while at a conference in Sweden in 2000. The WHO recommended that Mongolia establish at least 150 palliative care beds, but at the time the country had none and terminology for palliative care in Mongolia didn't exist. Dr. Davaasuren was determined to change the status quo and since then has worked hard to spread awareness of the importance of palliative care.
