Today is Human Rights Day. It's a day when we should renew our commitment to helping people displaced by war and violence, but instead our leaders are considering legislation that would make it even harder for refugees to find safe haven.

Congress could soon vote on budget legislation that, among other things, would virtually stop U.S. acceptance of Syrian refugees by adding harmful riders and other restrictions to refugee resettlement programs.

There's not a minute to waste. We need to speak up for refugees now.

Send a message to Congress right now, Heidi. Tell them you oppose any and all efforts to discriminate against Syrian refugees.

This message of exclusion and discrimination is *not* one our country needs to be sending on a day dedicated to honoring human rights. We know there are many in Congress who agree, and who are ready and willing to stand up for refugees — they just need to know

their constituents are with them. It's critical that you get in touch with your congresspeople and let them know where you stand.

Becoming a refugee is one of the hardest ways to settle in our country. Our government already has extensive security checks in place for all refugees — whether they're coming from majority-Muslim countries like Syria or not.

But the politicians behind these efforts are betting that fear and distrust will get the best of us — that we won't push them to do the right thing. I hope you'll help me prove them wrong today.

Make sure your congresspeople know what you expect: moral leadership and political courage.

Tell them to stand against fearmongering and for human rights. Send your message now.

During the Nazi occupation of Germany, the United States chose to ignore the plight of European refugees — driven, in part, by disdain for Jews.

Do any of us think that was the right decision? Of course not. How many precious lives could we have saved if we'd led with moral courage then? What would you give now to travel back in time and change the vote that slammed our doors in their weary, desperate faces? Congress faces that choice again, and so do we.

The people who most need our help right now aren't just refugees — they're mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, sons, and daughters. They're farmers, teachers, doctors, and merchants. They're running scared with barely any of their belongings, crossing fields in the dead of night while soldiers chase them, guns loaded.

We can't turn our backs on them. Send your message now.
